Study Abroad at the University of Liverpool

Study Abroad students at the University of Liverpool have access to a wide range of modules across our departments. The majority of modules are worth 15 or 30 Liverpool credits: you can take a **minimum of 45 credits and a maximum of 60 credits per semester** while studying with us. When selecting modules, ensure that:

- ✓ Your choices are approved by your home University
- ✓ Erasmus students: at least 50% of your modules are from the subject area listed on your learning agreement
- ✓ You are eligible for the course

Understanding this guide: glossary of terms

Module: At the University of Liverpool a unit of study is referred to as a **module**. A course refers to someone's degree of study; i.e. someone may take an Economics *module* as part of their wider Business related *course*.

Credits: While studying at Liverpool you will earn transferrable *credits* to take back to your home University. Whilst at Liverpool you must be enrolled on a minimum of 45 *credits* and a maximum of 60. 60 Liverpool credits are equivalent to 30 ECTS. You should list a minimum of 90 credits on your application in order to have **back ups.**

International Opportunities Advisor (IOA): Each academic department has an IOA who will review your module selections in Mobility Online. They will approve or reject your choices based on your academic transcript and the pre-requisites of the module. If your choice is rejected you may need to make further choices; see page 7 for more details.

Level: You can tell what year of study a module is from by looking at its **module code** which tells you its **level.** Study Abroad students are generally recommended to take level 4-6 modules.

Level	Module Code starts with	Year of Study
4	1	1 st
5	2	2 nd
6	3	3 rd (final year)
7	4 and 5	Postgraduate (Masters)

For example, POLI208 is a **second year module.**

Semester The academic year comprises two semesters. Semester 1 takes place between September and January. Semester 2 starts in late January and finishes in June. When selecting modules ensure your choice takes place in the **correct semester**; you will be rejected for any modules not offered in your semester of study.

Pre-requisites Each module lists pre-requisites that you must have before enrolling on the course. This could be prior experience in the subject area or a specific course that you must have taken the equivalent of at your home university. **Do not apply** for modules for which you do not have the pre-requisites.




How to use this guide


- In the Guide you will find each school or department listed alphabetically. Read the guidance closely and then **copy and paste** the link into your browser. You will then have access to the full list of modules available.
- **Using the guidance,** identify modules for which you are eligible, would like to study and are approved by your home university and input the module code and title into your Mobility Online application.
- Your modules will then be subject to academic approval by our International Opportunities
 Advisors. You cannot be issued an offer until you have been approved for at least 45 credits.
 Therefore we advise you to list at least 90 credits worth of modules so that you have back ups should you not be approved for your first choices.

PLEASE NOTE: List your modules in Mobility Online in <u>order of preference</u>. Where possible you will be registered for the first 60 credits for which you are approved but this is <u>not guaranteed</u> due to unforeseen timetabling and availability issues. Therefore you should list <u>back-up</u> <u>modules</u> to ensure you access modules you need to study.

Frequently Asked Questions

Can I take any module from any department?

Erasmus+ students should take 50% of their modules from the subject area of their learning agreement. Beyond this you are free to take a selection of modules but it is **your responsibility** to ensure the credits will be transferrable to your home university. Furthermore, ensure you meet the **pre-requisites** for the module.

I have core modules essential to my degree progression; can I study these at Liverpool?

We **do not** advise that you take core modules while studying abroad, as we cannot guarantee module availability. We would advise you to study elective or optional modules with us to ensure you get your preferred choices and can transfer credit back home.

How many credits can I take?

In order to study with us you must be enrolled on a minimum of **45 Liverpool credits.** You can study a maximum of **60 Liverpool credits.** Remember however to list more modules on your application (see next point).

Once my modules are approved are they guaranteed?

Due to timetabling and class sizes we **cannot guarantee** that you will be registered for your approved classes exactly as they appear on your offer letter. You should therefore list **at least 90 credits** worth of modules **in order of preference** to give yourself back-up choices. Where possible, you will be registered for your **first 60 approved credits.**

How long will it take to receive an offer once I have inputted my module choices?

We work with our academic colleagues to get your modules approved as soon as possible. At peak times there may be a delay and thank you for your patience in the interim.

I have been approved for less than 45 credits, what should I do?

If you are registered for less than 45 credits you will receive an email asking you to select further module choices. Use this Guide to select your further choices and email them to **erasmus@liv.ac.uk**

Can I see the class times for my modules?

You will be able to access your timetable shortly before the start of the semester. The central timetables are not finalised until this time.

I have received an offer but have changed my mind; can I change my modules?

After you have received an offer your next opportunity to edit your module choices is within the first 2 weeks of the semester. We explain this thoroughly in Orientation.



Academic Schools/Departments open to inbound Study Abroad students

Archaeology, Classics and Egyptology (ACE), Department of

<u>General Guidance</u>: Access to some language modules (e.g. Greek, Latin) depend on the level of previous experience. You must have completed appropriate courses/classes in the language at your home university if you want to do higher level (2nd year or above) language modules.

If you do not have any experience with the language in question, you should take 1st year modules.

You should also check the pre-requisites for non-language modules carefully. 2nd and 3rd year modules may require detailed subject knowledge. If you do not have this, you should choose a 1st year module.

Architecture, School of

<u>General Guidance</u>: Study Abroad students are strongly advised to begin their period of study in Architecture in Semester One. It is required that you upload your portfolio with your latest work to be vetted by the academic. Incoming Students wishing to take 3rd year modules only, will be offered the same core modules as Liverpool students, with no choice or options. For those exchanging into 4th year (i.e. MArch level), the options are similarly limited to the 'standard' set that Liverpool students take.

In Semester 1 the modules will be that of all 4th year MArch student. In Semester 2 it is recommended Practice Management and Law (ARCH405) is replaced with either ARCH311 or ARCH 371.

It may be possible for PG students with an appropriate level of applicable prior study to exchange onto a module from our MA/MSc Architecture programmes https://www.liverpool.ac.uk/study/postgraduate-taught/courses/taught/departments/index.php?department=architecture or https://www.malsa.org.uk/?page_id=107

Recommended modules: None specified

<u>Closed modules:</u> Please note that modules from MA Architecture (postgraduate Masters) and MArch are not available to undergraduate 4th year Incoming Study Abroad students. For those exchanging to 4th year, the options are similarly limited to the 'standard' set that home students take:

Semester 1: ARCH401, ARCH402 and ARCH407

Semester 2: ARCH403, ARCH404, plus ARCH311, ARCH371 if studying for one semester only

Chemistry, Department of

<u>General Guidance</u>: All modules listed are available to Study Abroad students except the closed modules listed below. However, we recommend students to choose modules from the same year of study (i.e. all 2nd year) to avoid any timetable clashes. For example, choosing a combination of modules from Year 2 & 3 usually results in timetable clashes.

CHEM356 and CHEM366 modules are available to students who have completed Year 2 or above. Students who wish to take CHEM356/CHEM366 module must submit a statement describing their research interests by mid-November. The information about the Chemistry research groups is available via https://www.liverpool.ac.uk/chemistry/research/.

Communication and Media, Department of

General Guidance: First year or final year modules are usually not open to Study Abroad students.

Recommended modules: None specified

<u>Closed modules:</u> COMM260, COMM600 and all 1st, 3rd year and Masters (400 code) modules are closed to Study Abroad students. COMM216 and COMM244 will no longer be running in Semester 2.

<u>Computer Science, Department of</u>

<u>General Guidance</u>: Some modules at Masters level need to be discussed on a case by case basis with the Departmental Study Abroad Co-ordinator.

<u>Closed modules:</u> All CKIT coded modules, COMP284, COMP299, COMP390, COMP391, COMP392, COMP393, COMP394 and COMP395.

Earth, Ocean & Ecological, Department of

<u>General Guidance</u>: The Department hosts a huge range of modules on a variety of subjects. However incoming students are strongly advised to follow the UK model of study by aligning themselves with one of our existing degree programmes and joining a cohort of students, normally at level 5 FHEQ. Our degree programmes are in the areas of Geology and Geophysics, Ocean Sciences and Ecology and Marine Biology.

A number of our modules involve field classes ranging in duration from local day visits through to long duration overseas visits. Incoming Study Abroad students wishing to take a module involving a field class element will be required to make a contribution towards the cost of the class, which can range from a few pounds for a day-visit, through to c. £1,500 for two-weeks in Singapore. The exact cost associated with a given field class activity can be provided on request (as they change year-to-year). Depending on your country of origin you may need a visa for international field classes

Recommended modules: None specified

<u>Closed modules:</u> None specified except for Masters-level Year 4 modules, which are only open to students with three-years of prior undergraduate study in Geoscience.

Electrical Engineering & Electronics, Department of

General Guidance: You should choose suitable 2nd or 3rd year modules (e.g. ELEC270 and ELEC311). Students should have completed pre-requisite modules in their home Universities.

Recommended modules: None specified

<u>Closed modules:</u> All 1st year modules and ELEC222, ELEC224, ELEC273, ELEC299, ELEC340, ELEC440, ELEC450, ELEC460, ELEC483, ELEC498 and ELEC499 are closed to Study Abroad students. Masters level modules can only be taken with your Home University's consent.

Engineering, School of

General Guidance: You should choose 2nd or 3rd year modules.

<u>Closed modules:</u> All 1st year modules and all Pilot Studies modules are closed to study abroad students

English, Department of

<u>General Guidance</u>: Should students wish to take any year 2 and/or Year 3 Literature modules in the School of English, the student should have taken at least <u>one</u> module related to the study of literature at their home university. Should students wish to take any year 2 and/or year 3 language modules in the Department of English, the student should have taken at least <u>one</u> module in the study of Language at their home university. A high level of English language competency (including oral and written English) is expected for all modules in the English department.

Please note that ENGL400: Language and Gender is a third year module and is available to Study Abroad students.

Closed modules: Work Experience and Dissertation modules

Geography and Planning, Department of

General Guidance:

As a guide, all of our Level 2 and 3 modules are normally available to Study Abroad students, subject to their prior education having covered material equivalent to that of any stated module pre-requisites. (Continued next page)

A number of our modules involve field classes ranging in duration from local day visits through to long duration overseas visits. Incoming Study Abroad students wishing to take a module involving a field class element will be required to make a contribution towards the cost of the class, which can range from a few pounds for a day-visit, through to c. £1,500 for two-weeks in Canada. The exact cost associated with a given field class activity can be provided on request (as they change year-to-year). Depending on your country of origin you may need a visa for international field classes.

Life Sciences, School of

<u>General Guidance:</u> No specific guidelines – each application is considered individually. Students may select LIFE coded modules from Levels 1, 2 and 3, depending on their academic background and interest. Students should be aware that many modules normally have pre-requisite modules. There is also a risk that there may be timetable clashes between modules at the different levels.

Please note LIFE218, LIFE219 and LIFE220 are only open to Anatomy students.

Management School (ULMS)

<u>General Guidance</u>: Students should read the guidance provided in the available modules list using the web link below. Students who are majoring in business related subjects at their home university are able to take up to a maximum of 4 modules per semester in the management school. Students who are not studying business related subjects at their home university may only choose up to a maximum of 2 modules per semester. Changes to modules can be made within the first two weeks of each semester, however, it is students' responsibility to ensure that they have the approval of their home university before making such changes. Please ensure you only select modules that you have the pre-requisite study for; if you do not have the required level of study you will not be accepted onto the module. All module selections and changes are subject to timetabling availability. Please ensure that you select at least 6 modules and list them in order of preference, this will speed up the process of adjusting module selection due to classes being full or timetable clashes.

<u>Closed modules</u>: All first year modules are closed to exchange students, with the exception of MKIB 153 "Fundamentals of Marketing" which is only available to Copenhagen Business School Students. All postgraduate modules are closed to exchange students.

Mathematical Sciences, Department of

<u>General Guidance</u>: Study Abroad students will normally take Level 2 and Level 3 modules, but where academically appropriate they can take Level 1 and Level 4 modules.

Recommended modules: Taking modules across levels will increase the possibility of timetable clashes

Closed modules: MATH270, MATH271, MATH272 and MATH291 are not available for Study Abroad students

Modern Languages and Cultures, Department of

The Department of Modern Languages and Cultures consists of the follow subject areas: **Basque, Catalan, Chinese, Film Studies, French, German, Italian, Portuguese, and Spanish.**

<u>General Guidance</u>: In MLC we offer a wide range of both language and culture modules. All of these are available to Study Abroad students, with the exception of the closed modules listed below. Applications are considered individually, and acceptance is based on prior experience and suitability. Students should bear in mind that they will usually need to have an appropriate level of competence in the target language (usually, B1/B2 and above) to be able to study materials in the original on cultural modules. Language modules at Liverpool are offered at 5 different levels, where the four letter prefix indicates the language and the final two digits of the code the language level (from 01 to 12). French (FREN) is used below as an example:

Beginner (A1/A1+): FREN101/102 Elementary (A2/A2+): FREN103/104 Intermediate (B1): FREN105/106 Advanced (B1+/B2): FREN207/208 Proficiency (C1/C2): FREN311/312

These modules are open to Study Abroad students with the appropriate prior language-learning experience. N.B. In some language areas modules are taught together at a faster pace: e.g. PORT112, CHIN256.

In the following languages, modules 112 and 134 will not normally be available to Study Abroad students: CHIN, FREN, GRMN, ITAL, SPAN. Students interested in PORT112 and PORT134 (Portuguese beginners should register for PORT322 and PORT324 instead).

All language areas: Language modules are <u>not</u> open to native speakers of that language. MODL307 and MODL312 are closed to Study Abroad students. MODL311 is open, though students must have C1/C2-level English.

Film Studies: FILM101, FILM102 and FILM103

French: FREN114 and FREN343

German: GRMN127 and GRMN128

Hispanic Studies: HISP120 and HISP121

Italian: ITAL120, ITAL121 and ITAL321

Music, Department of

<u>General Guidance</u>: Students wishing to register for modules in the Department of Music have a vast array of choices. Nonetheless, it is important to consider that some modules have pre-requisites. In some cases these are specific modules, and you have to demonstrate that you registered in a comparable module at your home institution. In other cases, they imply that the student has a certain level of proficiency in different areas. In either case you have to demonstrate that you have the relevant background in order to register to some modules. Therefore, before making you choices, please consider the following:

- a) Modules in Classical music history, Analysis, and Composition require a good level of notational literacy;
- b) Students wishing to take Performance modules should demonstrate a developed proficiency in one instrument or voice;
- c) Second year modules in Music Technology need some basic music technology experience and third year modules will only be open to students with suitable prior experience;
- d) Composition modules require some prior experience and students may be asked for further details to assess their suitability.
- e) Anybody can do the first year modules, but they should know that for MUSI 109 they have to write music
- f) Students wanting to study third year modules need to be checked carefully for some suitable prior experience

Recommended modules: None specified

<u>Closed modules</u>: Modules in research (including dissertation) run across the whole session (semesters one and two), and so may not be appropriate for Incoming Study Abroad students, although they may be available by negotiation to those students who will be present for the whole academic session.

Philosophy, Department of

<u>General Guidance</u>: Year 2 modules are generally suitable for study abroad students, but PHIL207 (Logic) requires prior knowledge of symbolic logic. Choosing modules from both Year 1 and Year 2 may result in timetable clashes. Year 3 modules usually require a good background in Philosophy.

Politics, Department of

<u>General Guidance</u>: Year 2 and Year 3 modules are suitable to Study Abroad students. Please be aware that some modules have limited availability and places will be given on a first-come-first-served basis.

<u>Recommended modules:</u> POLI225 International Institutions, POLI222 Regimes and their Consequences, POLI223 Contemporary Populist Politics: Britain in Comparative Perspective, POLI328 EU as an International Actor, POLI349 Gender and Global Politics Women, Peace and Security, POLI307 Comparative and International Judicial Politics.

<u>Closed modules</u>: Year 1 modules, MA modules, POLI200, POLI339 and POLI401.

Psychology, School of

General Guidance: The Incoming Study Abroad students can choose from the list of Level 2 and Level 3 modules on the website, with the exceptions listed below. Students without a Psychology background can choose Level 1 modules, again with the exceptions listed below. Level 2 and 3 modules will not be available to students that come from programmes other than Psychology.

Recommended modules: For students from a Psychology programme we recommend that they select Level 3 modules rather than Level 2.

Sociology, Social Policy & Criminology, Department of

General Guidance: Each application is considered individually

Recommended modules: For students interested in criminology the modules SOCI252, SOCI308, SOCI319 and SOCI341 are recommended. For students who are undertaking programmes in the field of Geography or Architecture SOCI236 and SOCI372 may be of interest.

Closed modules:

All 1st year modules (Level 4 FHEQ) e.g. SOCI101, SOCI 108 etc.

The following 2nd and 3rd year modules SOCI202, SOCI204, SOCI218 SOCI235, SOCI307, SOCI317, SOCI320, SOCI321, SOCI323, SOCI333, SOCI352 and SOCI369
